Letter from our Minister

God's Promises, Our Faithful Journey

Dear friends,

As we move through the rhythms of this season, from Easter through to Pentecost, I've been reflecting on my faith journey and on the journey of faith of the people in the churches of the Ipswich and East Pastorate.

Some deep and hopeful words are found in Romans 4:13–25. In this passage, Paul tells the story of Abraham, not as a perfect man, but as a person of deep trust. Paul reminds us that it wasn't Abraham's actions or adherence to rules that secured God's promise — it was his faith. A simple, steadfast belief that God's promise was for him, even when the evidence in front of him seemed to say otherwise. This big idea — that God's promises are realized through faith — is both timeless and incredibly timely. Especially in a world that often measures worth through productivity, conformity, or power, Paul's message is a liberating one. The promise doesn't depend on our perfection. It doesn't require that we fit a certain mould or tick all the boxes. The promise is grace. And it's for all of us.

What I love about this passage is its expansive vision. Paul isn't just talking to one group. He's deliberately opening up the story — saying, "Look, Abraham didn't receive the promise through the law, following a whole set of rules, but through faith." That means the promise wasn't just for a specific lineage or those who followed a certain path. It was, and is, for everyone who trusts in the God of love and life. In our own context, this has powerful implications. It reminds us that God's promises include those who have been pushed to the margins, excluded from churches, or told they don't belong. Faith, Paul says, is what unites us — not dogma, not doctrine, and certainly not exclusion. In this light, we read Abraham's story not as a lesson in blind belief, but as a testament to trusting that God is still working, still fulfilling promises of justice, inclusion, and peace.

Faith isn't about having all the answers. It's about accepting and embracing God's promise, even when it's hard to see the way forward. It's about believing that resurrection is possible — in our lives, in our communities, in the broken places of the world. And welcoming that the Holy Spirit does dwell and work in us even when we sometimes question what we see and do.

So, let's be people who live by faith. Not just in belief, but in action. Let's continue to build a church where all are welcomed, where diversity is cherished, and where God's promises come alive through the way we love one another.

News from Bangladesh- Summer 2025

When Maydul Hassan was first mugged, he thought he had hit rock bottom. But within a week, the 21-year-old student was battered and robbed again – this time in front of the police, who, according to Hassan, did nothing. Hassan participated in the student-led uprising that helped to unseat long-time Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina. But Hassan wonders what the country has become. "The nation is drowning in crime, no one seems to care."

Hassan's ordeal is not an isolated case. Over 170 million people call Bangladesh home, but the country is experiencing a terrible crime wave. Since the fall of Sheikh Hasina's government, walking the streets has become extremely risky. According to Al Jazeera, in January 2025 alone the police reported 242 cases of mugging and robbery across Bangladesh – the highest number in six years. At least 294 murders were recorded. Robberies, muggings and abductions are all on the rise.

All the more reason for *Commitment for Life* to continue its work through its Christian Aid partners in Bangladesh. We assist some of the poorest communities, empowering them, even during this politically, environmentally, and economically fraught time.

Eco-Church

On Sunday 27th April, our Church service focused on Eco-Church. We led the Café Church service which had been prepared by Adam for all the churches in the Ipswich and East Pastorate. The theme was "Food for Thought". Claire had prepared a quiz which is reproduced at the end of this article for you to try if you weren't at the service! (Answers on page 13). We watched a video which had been prepared by Adams' wife which informed us of lots of interesting facts about our food, including the number of people it takes to provide us with our toast in the morning – over 100! Members of the congregation were asked to commit to an action they would take which would benefit those who produce our food and/or the environment. These commitments were written on the back of pictures of various foodstuffs and are displayed in the church. Here are some of them -

- I will buy more local food
- I will grow some vegetables, herbs and salads
- I won't buy farmed fish
- I will buy Fairtrade
- I will be more aware of where food comes from
- I will eat more plant based food
- I will reduce my consumption of meat
- I will buy food in season
- I will make my own sauces

We are pleased to report that our swifts have returned and are starting to take an interest in the swift boxes. It is amazing that they have found their way back from Africa and even more amazing that they will have been on the wing ever since they left the nest boxes at the end of August last year! Wild flowers in the garden at time of going to press: meadow buttercups, creeping buttercup, red campion, self heal, dandelions, daisies, tutsan, greater hawkbit, mouse-ear hawkweed, birds foot trefoil, green alkanet, greater celandine, cow parsley and orange Welsh poppy.
